

Barque Brunett heading Towards Falmouth
 Monday July 10th 1843 all these 24 hours moderate breezes from SSW and SE
 Barque heading to by N: at 4 P.M. boarded Ship Hope
 well of Philadelphia 10 days from New York got some
 small stores and newspapers: at daylight made
 sail and commenced ratting the fore rigging at
 11 AM saw a Brig steering to the Eastward apparently
 a whaler

July 11th 1843 these 24 hours fine breezes from the Southward
 and Westward Barque heading to the Westward
 tack employed in ratting the rigging
 one year out to day with nearly 300 lbs
 hard but fair

Wednesday July 12th 1843 all these 24 hours fine breezes from the
 SSW finished the fore rigging and commenced
 on the main at sunset double reefed the
 topsails and wore ship to the Eastward
 at daylight made all sail and wore round
 to the Westward hope we shall continue
 so I am about discouraged with this
 voyage; at noon spoke an English Barque
 from the West Indies bound to London

Thursday July 13th 1843 these 24 hours light breezes from the Southward
 Barque heading to the Westward at sunset handed
 the light sails & luffed to the wind; at daylight
 made sail & kept off NE the watch employed as
 yesterday I hope we shall have a NE gale and
 compel the old man to steer to the Westward

Friday July 14th 1843 these 24 hours commenced with fresh breezes from the
 SSW the watch employed in fitting the main rigging
 at sunset took in sail and luffed to the wind; at
 daylight made sail; at 5³⁰ AM raised a sheet
 of large Sperm Whales lowered the boats the
 Capt succeeded in striking one; but by some
 unlucky means the iron drewed, the Whales
 went off to the windward; chased them till 9 AM
 and gave up & came on board "pretty low spirits"
 at 10 the Whales went out of sight from the
 mast so ends these 24 hours

Saturday July 15th 1843 these 24 hours strong winds & heavy squalls
 varying from S to N. Barque heading to
 the SE took in and made sail as occasion
 required; at daylight wore ship to the Westward
 Capt talks of cruising a month longer unless
 we get another large Whale every one seems
 about discouraged and want to go home a
