 Thursday August 3<sup>rd</sup> 1873 first & middle part fresh breezes from the N. E. steering West as a course latter part strong breeze  
 Course W by S the watch variously employed in Ships duty such as scraping the topmasts &c, Capt employed in turning round heads and other small notions

 Long by Chro 60° 39' W  
 Long by Lunar 60° 37' W

Friday August 4<sup>th</sup> 1873 these 24 hours commenced with brisk breezes from the S. W. steering West sun & sail in the afternoon; at 4 P.M. took in the waste boat to paint put her in the bearers at 5 A.M. passed a whaling brig steering to the Eastward I suspect it was the Laurel; finish painting the waste boat have about got through with fitting and painting that and now we want a smart South Easter to drive the old Barque ahead; latter part light air and calm miles

S. E. of Cape Head 620 Dist

Saturday August 5<sup>th</sup> 1873 first part light air from the S. W. steering W by N at sunset died away calm chud down the top gallant sails; at daylight a light breeze sprang up from the Westward made sail and stood to the S. W. at 10 A.M. shifted in a squall to the N. E. and rained; at 11 lighted up; course W by N. 30° these sails in sight from the mast head

 Sunday August 6<sup>th</sup> 1873 these 24 hours began with moderate breezes from the N. E. and cloudy weather steering W. N. W. as a course middle part wind from N. E. to E. N. E. latter part light from the Eastward saw two sails from the mast head steering to the N. W. I am in hopes to spend the next Sabbath at Church if fortune favor us with a breeze

Way Head 500 miles distant  
 Lat by obs 37° 36' N  
 Long by Chro 63° 54' W

Monday August 7<sup>th</sup> 1873 these 24 hours commenced with moderate breezes from the E. S. E. course W. N. W. middle part wind shifted to the Southward; at daylight continued to the S. W. after breakfast put the waste boat out on the cranes latter part Mr Lawrence and his watch employed in making the Brunett a new signal out of cables

Lat by obs 34° 35' N  
 Long by Chro 64° 33' W

Tuesday August 8<sup>th</sup> these 24 hours commenced with moderate breezes from the S. W. Barque heading W. N. W. at 2 P.M. wind headed took in the studding sail after 4 o'clock got out flour and water wet the hold and washed off the decks; at 11:30 midnight tacked ship headed up the N. W. at 2 A.M. sharp lightning and distant thunder in the N. W. at 9 A.M. took a smart squall from that way called all hands chud up the topsails; at 10 made all sail again and sent the water below again latter part light breezes from the N. W. Barque heading W. N. W.
