fresh gales stood to the south
saw one fin back Lat 39.12 S

Tuesday noon 10th
Begins with fresh gales at N.W.
stood to E.N.E in company
with ship Georgia & London
Middle part thick and rainy
Latter fresh breezes and
cloudy saw fin back
Lat 39.28 S
Long 39.45 E

Whales in Indian Ocean 1835 113
Wednesday noon 11th
Begins with fresh short winds
and fine weather stood to
N.W. saw fin back spoke
and boarded ship Georgia
Middle part thick with rain
Latter strong gales from the south
steered S.W. & under close reefed
top sails and course saw one ship
saw no whales Lat 39.04 S
Long 39.15 E

Thursday noon 12th
Begins with strong gales at South
steering S.W. & saw one fin back
at 10th took in fore and mizen
top sails fresh breezes and cloudy
Middle part more moderate
steered S.W. & E
Latter light breezes steered
N.W. by the wind saw nothing
the watch employed in mending
and middle reaming main top sail
Lat 39.39 S
Long 39.09 E
Long 39.21 E

Friday noon 13th
Begins with light S.W. & E winds
and flying clouds stood to
N.W. saw one fin back
finished the main top sail and
sent it
Middle part strong gales
Latter the same with heavy rain
headed to S.E. saw nothing
No Os
