cloudy stood to the N.W. at 2 P.M. wind
E.S.E. headed. S.W. water very
green sounded at 6 P.M.
no Bottom with 115 fathoms line
fresh breezes double reefed the top sails
Middle part fresh gales at E.S.E.
Latter the same with rain
No Ob.

Thursday March 31st
Begins with strong gales at E.S.E.
and rain headed to the South by
the wind under close reefed top sails
at 5 P.M. spoke the schooner
Hope and Susan Shantucket 30 hours
out bound to Baltimore
Middle part strong S.E. winds
at 11 P.M. sounded in 45 fathoms
white sand with black specks
Latter light S.W. winds stood
to the East 3 sail in sight
Lat 39. 36. N
Long 72. 40 W

Friday April 1st
Begins with light N.W. winds
and fine weather stood to
the East by the wind
Middle part calm
Latter the same one sail in sight
35 fathoms water. Lat 39. 43

Providence 1836
Saturday April 2d
Begins with calm and pleasant
weather at 5 P.M. light air from
S.E. stood to the N.E. thick at 7 P.M.
with some rain one ship in sight
and one schooner sounded in
35 fathoms water Grey and Yellow
sand mixed with shells
Middle part calm
Latter the same

Lat 39. 58. N
Long 73. 00

Sunday April 3d
Begins calm at 12 P.M. spoke Bark
Mary Ballard from N. York for
Batavia also Bark Neptune
from N. York for St. Salvador
Middle part light air
Latter the same from the West
course N.E. with all sail set rounded
in 32 fathoms water white sand with
black specks 2 sail in sight
Lat 40. 29. N
Long 72. 29 W

Monday April 4th
Begins with light air from the West
steered N.E. with all drawing
sail set one sail in sight
Middle part light breezes and thick
fog at 7 A.M. hove to with the
Main yard aback at 12 noon
sounded in 26 fms no ends
