

293 Remarks on board of the Ship Endeavour of Peavichaven

Remarks on Monday August 5. 1835

this 24 hours begins with fine weather laying off & on at Chitahoo & had the gunnys all day. latter part of the day fine weather laying off & on at Chitahoo trading with the natives at 8 PM Mr. McHugh went ashore & carried Jacob tripp ashore with the survey & left him at 10 AM the boat came on board & brought old tort collars of at 11 AM the boat went ashore to carry the women 25 all told. Ends this day.

294 Remarks on Tuesday August 6. 1835

this 24 hours begins with fine weather laying off & on at Chitahoo at 2 PM the boat went on shore to carry old tort & was discharged at noon by the name of William Putrons belonging to Nelson's port boat came on board & was steered out to the south by the wind with 20 souls on board. latter part of the day strong winds & squally weather at 7 PM tacked ship & stood in for the land between Chitahoo & Mungdalen. Ends this day.

295 Remarks on Wednesday August 7. 1835

this 24 hours begins with strong breeze & squally by spells at 5 PM tacked ship to the south at sunset Mungdalen bore ESE. 10 miles in distance 6 leagues standing to the south under double reef topsails middle & latter part of the day strong winds & rising clouds at 5 PM were ship to the S & E. employed in washing etc.

296 Remarks on Thursday August 8. 1835

this 24 hours begins with strong winds & rugged steering to the N & E with a very high sea at sunset Chitahoo bore East from us distance 20 miles latter part of the day fresh winds & rugged weather at 5 AM were ship to the S & E employed in breaking out the fore hole after weather. Ends this 24 hours strong wind & rugged. Put in by 11 AM 9. 58 with.

297 Remarks on Friday August 9. 1835

Remarks on Sunday August 9. 1835

this 24 hours begins with strong winds & rugged steering to the N & E employed in ship duty at sunset double reefed the topsails & were ship to the S & E at sunset Chitahoo bore SE from us distance 25 miles middle & latter part of the 24 hours fresh winds & calms off the west side of dominion. Ends this day.

298 Remarks on Monday August 10. 1835

this 24 hours begins with fresh winds & rugged beating up to Chitahoo at sunset double reefed the topsails strong breeze at sunset Chitahoo bore SE from us distance 20 miles latter part of the 24 hours fresh winds & squally by spells beating up to Chitahoo at 11 AM saw a ship laying off & on at dominion. Ends this day.

299 Remarks on Tuesday August 11. 1835

this day begins with fresh winds & rising clouds beating to the windward at sunset spoke the ship bay of Warren R. 24 months out with 1700 lbs we spoke her about 2 miles from dominion & gamed with her they had been trading with the natives on dominion at 10 PM capt. Correll came on board & we stood in for Chitahoo under short sail we got her to the land at 10 o'clock.

latter part of the day fine weather laying off & on at Chitahoo at 9 AM the ship bay went in to anchor in reservation bay we were trading ashore brought some logs & etc.

300 Remarks on Wednesday August 12. 1835

this 24 hours begins with fine weather laying off & on at Chitahoo trading with the natives got some logs & took off Jacob tripp the man we left ashore at sunset the boat went on board of the bay at 8 PM boat came on board & we steered for new haven this ends with rain & squally by spells steering towards harbor.

301 Remarks on Thursday August 13. 1835

this 24 hours begins with a fine breeze & small showers of rain by spells at sunset shortened sail of between Rooker & new haven latter part of the day fine weather laying off & on at new haven trading got some potatoes & etc. Ends this day.
