

Monday.

Jan 2nd 1882

This day moderate breeze from the N S W weather thick and rainy saw one sail and a fin back employed boiling and breaking out whorls, no observation so ends.

Tuesday.

Jan 3rd

This day strong breeze from the N N W ship on the wind cruising weather thick and rainy, employed cooping and getting ready to stow oil finished boiling last night the whales turned up 140 bl nothing been seen to day so ends.

Wednesday.

Jan 4th

This day strong breeze from the N N W weather thick and muggy. men employed stowing oil, got down 92 bl. nothing been seen to day so ends.

Thursday

Jan 5th

This day blowing strong from the N by N ship stood on opposite tacks nothing been seen to day except a whale carcass, so ends.

Friday

Jan 6th

This day blowing strong from the N. ship on the port tack heading N N W. cooper employed repairing the stage got it done and put it out nothing been seen except birds so ends.

Saturday

Jan 7th

This day strong breeze from the N N ship working to windward, about 12 o'clock from boat-stern raised sperm whales three miles to windward of ship going quick to the windward could not gain on them so did not lower, employed stowing the remainder of the oil stowed down in all 740 bl whale oil.

Sunday

Jan 8th 1882

This day strong breeze from the N N ship steering S E. about 7 A M. Mr Kings raised right-whales lowered three boats and the Starboard & Waist-boats struck took one along side about 2 O'clock got the other along side and putting in the fluke chain it parted got it along side again about 6 O'clock and every thing made secure, got supper and set the watches, weather moderating so ends.

Monday.

Jan 9th

This day blowing very strong from the N. at day light called all hands intending to cut but it was so rugged could not do any thing very high sea on, nothing been seen to day barometer rising so ends this day.

Tuesday.

Jan 10th

This day strong breeze from the N N and very heavy swell on at day light commenced to cut got them out in about 6 O'clock lost part of the bone and some of the blubber got supper set the watch and started the try works, nothing been seen so ends.

Wednesday

Jan 11th

This day very light breeze from the N N W. ship on the wind heading S N. Mr Wyman raised a whale saw him go flukes ahead of the ship saw him two risings and then went out of sight there was no wind so did not lower suppose it was a right-whale employed boiling so ends.
