

These whales were all seen 50 miles farther to the Eastward Chronometer out

Lat 35.16, Monday Oct 29th 1883. Long 169.30. This day blowing very strong from the S.E. ship on the wind working to the S.W. about 11.30 A.M. Sammie one of the foremast hands raised two right whales on the lee bow, lowered three boats and the Starboard boat struck got him along side about 3 P.M. got dinner and commenced to cut weather very rugged having a very hard time

Lat 35.12, Tuesday Oct 30th 1883. Long 169.50. This day strong breeze from the S ship on the wind heading S.E. about 4 P.M. Mr Cook raised right whales lowered three boats but without success night came on too soon, employed stowing down oil stowed down 75 lbs saw the Alaska to the windward she had her boats down also saw one other sail to the leeward, weather good tonight started the trywks, saw five right whales to night

Lat 35.6, Wednesday Oct 31st 1883. Long 169.30. This day good breeze from the N.W. by N. at day light for boat steers raised right whales lowered three boats for them and chased until about 5 O'clock P.M. when the Waist-boat struck the bomb lance killed him instantly and he never came up went to him and took his line and tried to haul it up, but the line parted when we got it nearly up so lost the whale the same as the other we are feeling dreadfully about it two sails in sight chasing whales, employed boiling through the day so ends.

Lat 35.25, Thursday Nov 1st 1883. Long 169.48. This day strong breeze from the N. ship on the wind about 11.30 A.M. Mr Dyer raised two right whales on our weather bow working to the windward lowered three boats for them and the Starboard boat struck killed the whale worked the ship to the windward for them but it came in a thick fog and heavy rain so lost sight of them and as night came on they cut from the whale and came on board ship they put a waif in the whale, worked the ship through the night for it finished boiling about 1 O'clock P.M.

Lat 35.23, Friday Nov 2nd 1883. Long 169.33. This day strong breeze from the N.W. at day light the Cook raised two right whales on the weather beam about a mile off. Lowered three boats for them as soon as the boats lowered found our dead whale to the leeward close to, saw it out of the boats first, whales were going to the windward so called the boats aboard took our whale along side and cut him in about 3 O'clock got through and cleared away the head, all feeling very much pleased to find it, saw the Alaska whaling, and one other ship boiling so ends this day.

Lat 35.27, Saturday Nov 3rd 1883. Long 169.39. This day light breeze from the S.E. ship on the wind heading S.W. employed boiling and stowing oil about 5 P.M. John Mc Gade raised right whales lowered three boats and just at dark the Waist-boat struck took our whale along side and let it lay for the night saw the Alaska cutting, and afterwards saw her whaling, weather fine, killed two pigs
