Tuesday

Jan 22nd 1884

Long 172.21

First-part of this day blowing strong from the N. & E. middle and latter part nearly a calm weather thick and rainy nothing been seen barometer very low stands at one tenth and a half below 29 to night-

Lat-45.5

Wednesday

Jan 23rd

This day blowing a very heavy gale from the S. first part steering W. & W. at noon luffed on the wind on the port-lack blowing very hard with rain barometer to night - inches below 29. this morning it was down to 28.65 nothing been seen.

Lat-44.22

Thursday

Jan 24th

Long 173.37

Still blowing a gale from the S. ship bore low, weather more moderating a little with rising barometer. saw a large merchant-ship this morning steering to the N. & E. weather quite thick.

Friday

Jan 25th

Lat-43.47

Still blowing a gale but more moderate than yesterday, weather thick nothing been seen except birds, set the fore top-sail to night.

Lat-44.14

Saturday

Jan 26th

Long 175.38

This day good weather with light-breezes from the S. & E. ship steering W. & S. W. saw the land & Bhatnam islands also a school of black fish broke out-beef & pork.

Lat-44.25

Sunday

Jan 27th

Long 176.1

First and middle part very light-breezes from the N. latter part good breezes from the same, ship steering N. & W. shaltered sail at sunset and luffed on the wind, caught a porpoise and struck a ^{small} ~~small~~ fish but lost it.

Monday

Jan 28th 1884

First-part of this day strong breezes from the N. ship on the wind. middle part the same latter part steering S. & W. saw the land the pyramid about seven miles off to windward weather thick and rainy.

Tuesday

Jan 29th

Lat-45.5

Long 177.19

This day blowing a strong gale from the W. by N. ship stood on opposite-lacks thick fog most of the time nothing been seen.

Wednesday

Jan 30th

Lat-45.7

Long 176.51

Blowing strong from the S. first part ship on the wind middle part steering N. by E. latter part blowing very strong luffed on the wind saw any amount of comies so ends this day.

Thursday

Jan 31st

92 bbls



This day good breezes from the W. & S. W. about 7 A.M. Maurice Harington raised a school of sperm whales off the pyramid going E. & N. E. loaned three boats and the starboard boat struck took the whale along side about 10 o'clock got dinner and rose new cutting falls and went to cutting out the head off and let that lay for the night cut the body in got through about 12 o'clock there was a large body of them so ends.

Friday

Feb 1st

First and middle part of this day strong breeze from the N. & W. latter part wind changed into the S. & W. strong breeze with rain took the head in this morning employed boiling the head & cutting up the junk saw the land to the windward, any amount of birds around the ship.
