Friday

June 6th 1884

Long 176. 40

Very strong breeze from the E by S ship stood on both tacks. shortened sail at dark and wore ship on the port tack nothing been seen today

Lat-26. 36

Saturday

June 7th

Long 176. 37

Strong breeze from the E ship stood on opposite tacks. about 4 P.M. spoke the merchant- Ship Ellen Goddard of Bath Maine last ^{from} British Columbia bound to Sydney Capt. Adams sent a boat to her and got some papers also saw one other sail called it a whaler under short sail. weather ends squally.

Lat-26. 17

Sunday

June 8th

Long 176. 29

Strong breezes from the E by S ship stood on opposite tacks. shortened sail at dark nothing been seen except fish

Lat-25. 57

Monday

June 9th

Long 176. 12

First and middle part of this day strong breeze from the E ship on the port tack working to the S.E. latter part moderate breeze from the same employed stowing oil saw several fin backs and plenty of fish so ends

Tuesday

June 10th

This day strong breeze from the N.E ship on the Starboard tack working to the N.W. weather thick and rainy at dark shortened sail and wore ship saw two hump backs no observation.

Wednesday

June 11th 1884

Blowing strong from the E weather very squally ship on the wind working to the N.E. nothing been seen rainy in squalls broke out a tin of kerosine oil men employed stowing up coals in the hold no observation so ends this day.

Thursday

June 12th

Still blowing strong from the E S.E. with rain in squalls ship on the wind working to the South weather very bad. cooper employed setting up shooks the others strapping blocks. nothing been seen today no observation.

Lat-26. 52

Friday

June 13th

Long 175. 58

Strong breezes from the E S.E. ship on the wind heading N.E. weather very squally and a high sea on many a one comes on deck cooper setting up shooks the others strapping blocks nothing been seen today so ends.

Saturday

June 14th

Lat-24. 50

Long 175. 22

First part strong breezes from the E S.E. middle and latter part moderate breeze from the same about 1 P.M. Mr. Cook raised a school of sperm whales on the bow going to the S.W. by W. lowered all the boats and got four whales one to each boat got them all along side about 7 O'clock got supper and set the watch. men employed wetting hold and setting up shooks. broke out flour
