Monday Oct 11th 1886
This day a calm nearly all day at day light commenced to cut got through about five o'clock got supper and set the watch light breeze sprung up made sail and steered S. weather fine

Tuesday Oct 12th
This day very light breezes from the E ship steering S. about 12 N. Mr Kings raised a school of sperm whales going N N W. very quick lowered the boats and chased until dark without success there being no wind could not get up with them employed boiling

Wednesday Oct 13th
First part of this day a dead calm, middle and latter parts very light breeze from the N N E. ship steering S by W. employed boiling, saw grampuses

Thursday Oct 14th
This day a calm with heavy rain squalls finished boiling this morning the whales turned up 63 bl. nothing in sight

Friday Oct 15th
This day a calm. with heavy rain at times, weather cloudy no observation nothing in sight.

Saturday Oct 16th 1886
This day baffling winds, mostly from the S ship on the wind trying to get to the S. several heavy rain squalls through the day saw a large steamer going the same way as ourselves,

Sunday Oct 17th
This day a hard rain storm and very light airs from no particular place, when we could have steamed away and had the breeze we steered S

Lat-5:20

Monday Oct 18th
This day moderate breezes from the S S W. ship on the southern tack under all sail, weather squally the latter part. Took up the potatoes and picked them over, saw one sail

Lat-5:1
Long 18.35

Tuesday Oct 19th
This day moderate breezes from the S S W. ship on the wind heading S E. two sails in sight going the same way as ourselves, broke out water

Wednesday Oct 20th
This day light breezes from the S S W. weather squally, heavy rain showers ship on the wind trying to get to the S. one sail in sight going the same way as ourselves, no observation
