the fore part of the day light breeze from the E. & E. & falling gradually to the N. the latter part light air & fine course E. Wind N. & E. S. B.

Saturday Nov 18th 1882

the fore part of the day fine weather wind S. & S. W. light the latter part the same with a few finbacks in sight. Course E by N.

Sunday Nov 19th 1882

the fore part light breeze N. course E by N the latter part light & fine weather wind from the same quarter. Course E by N. & N. A few sailboats -

Monday Nov 20th 1882

Land Chatham

the fore part of the day a good breeze from the N. W. Course E by N. & N. land raised a S. am - having E. & E. 2 merchantmen & one whale in sight to the leeward the latter part more ship & headed to the N - Run of & gained the S. of Denequin - finbacks -

Tuesday Nov 21st 1882

Smoky

the fore part of the day a fair breeze from the S. W. Course N. E. the latter part wind strong light - not a thing to be seen. Under short sail N. & N.

Wednesday Nov 22nd 1882

Landing C. W. M

the fore part of the day light breeze from the N. W. the latter part the same & a whale raised at 12.30 P. M. Stearing S. W. gained her at 1.30 P. M. Captain & wife went. 12 months out 470. & 1000 B.

Thursday Nov 23rd 1882

the fore part of the day fresh breeze from the N. E. all sail out heading to the N. C. W. N. Stearing the same. the latter part lighter breeze not a living thing to be seen -

the fore part of the day light breeze from the N. & E. - the latter part weather increasing fog. & plenty of whale feed in sun on the star tack by the wind. Killers & one finback -

Saturday Nov 25th 1882

Fog

the fore part a strong breeze with Rain sea from the N. & E. - two ships & shotlines sail on the Port S. heading E. by N. -

Plenty of finbacks & feed but no whales -

Lat 39.31 Long 174.16

Sunday Nov 26th 1882

Fog

the fore part of the day a strong breeze from the N. & N. W. with a head sea course E. the latter part moderating course N. E. by N. - plenty of finbacks & fog. has prevailed through the day

Lat 39.08 Long 172.27

Monday Nov 27th 1882

the fore part of the day fog with a good from the S. & E. Course N. E. by N. the latter part N. & defied to the wind on the Port tack & fog plenty of finbacks in sight going S. E. - Quick

Lat 37.55 Long 170.29

Tuesday Nov 28th 1882

the fore part of the day - vary light breeze from the N. & N. W. heading S. E. & a whale in sight ahead. at 12. Am. Rainier saw Whaling. the latter part got near enough to take one along side & kill another Charles W. Morgan done that work - All well

Lat 37.55 Long 170.26

Wednesday Nov 29th 1882

the fore part of the day a strong breeze & squalls. a Right whale Raised by Elton at 5.15 A. M. lowered 3 boats L. W. & J. boats. got close but preserved something & has not been seen since. the latter part blowing strong heading to the S. W. under lower to sail -
