

The bill entitled an Ordinance to preserve the health of the City of Baltimore and for the due performance of Quarantine at the port of Baltimore was read a first and by special order a second time and passed.

The following message was received from the Second Branch.

Gentlemen of the First Branch,
We have concurred in the resolution for appropriating a sum for filling in New Church Street, and the resolution appropriating seventy five dollars for regulating the town clock and we have concurred in the resolution for extending the fish market with an amendment viz; after the word "falls" insert "and for painting the roof of the present fish market". In this amendment the concurrence of your Branch is requested. We have not concurred in the resolution for sweeping the roofs of the Market houses. We have agreed to the proposition respecting the Common Market House which proposed amendment was agreed to by the ~~Second~~ Branch.

The bill entitled an Ordinance regulating the riding and driving of horses and carriages in the City of Baltimore was received from the Second Branch read a first and by special order a second time and passed.

On motion therefore the Branch adjourned until next Monday, afternoon at three o'clock.
