Petition of John Barre and others reported the following resolution which was read concurred in and sent to the Second Branch who also concurred in & returned the same  
Resolved that a sum not exceeding Four hundred dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of walling up and placing stone steps at the end of the public wharf leading from Harrison Street into Jones's Alley to be expended under the direction of the Mayor and City Commissioners.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration that part of the Mayor's Communication which relates to the Driving of Stages through the Streets of Baltimore reported a Bill entitled "A Supplement to the Ordinance regulating the riding and driving of Horses and Carriages in the City of Baltimore and for other purposes therein mentioned." which Bill was read a first and by Special Order the Second and third time passed and sent to the Second Branch.

A Petition from Elisha and George Bayley praying to be reimbursed in losses sustained by them in consequence of Contracts made with the City Commissioners for paving of Holliday and McElderry Streets, was presented & referred to Messrs. Genat, Jamison and Sheppard.

The Committee appointed to enquire into the propriety of placing flag or stepping stones between Market Space and the fish Market reported a Resolution appropriating the sum of One hundred and thirty five dollars for that purpose, which resolution was read and concurred in by the Branch.
