

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of George Warner & Others, made their Report by submitting the following Bill, entitled

"An Ordinance respecting wharfage of the Articles therein mentioned."

"Be it enacted and ordained, by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that the articles of Flour, Wheat and Indian Corn, be and they are hereby exempted from Wharfage, under the Ordinance of this Corporation."

Which being read the first, and by special order a second time was passed and sent to the second Branch who returned the same endorsed "Will not pass."

A Bill entitled "A Supplement to the Ordinance regulating the wharfage of Wood" was received from the second Branch, Read the first time and ordered to lie on the Table.

A Verbal communication was received from the second Branch informing that that body had adjourned until tomorrow afternoon, three o'clock; whereupon this Branch, on motion therefor, adjourned to the same hour.

The Branch met agreeably to adjournment. Present James Carey Esquire President, and all the other members except Mr. Jamison.

The Bill from the second Branch, entitled, "A Supplement to the Ordinance regulating the Wharfage of Wood" was called up to a second Reading, and with pass with the following amendment viz: Add to the Bill "And if any Wood shall remain more than the first twenty four hours, and less than a second twenty four hours, it shall be liable to a second wharfage for such intermediate time". Which amendment was agreed to by the second Branch.

The following Resolution was received from the second Branch viz: "Resolved that the sum of Seven hundred and fifty Dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated to be expended by the City Commissioners, with the approbation of the Mayor, for the purpose of paving Calvert Street across Chatham & Church Streets, and for taking up and repaving a part of Church Street" which being read the first & by special order a second time was concurred in.

A Resolution relative to Wharfage &c. was received
