The Branch met agreeably to adjournment.
Present James Carey Esquire President, and all
the other members.

The Bill entitled "A Supplement to the Ordinance for
the Inspection of Deep & Park in the City of Baltimore"
was read the second time and on the question being put
"shall this Bill pass?" The yeas and nays being required
appeared as follows. Affirmative. None.

Taylor, Dunwoody, Jamison, Warner, Robt, Wilson, Dyer,
Himmer, Sheppard & Burke. 16

So it was determined in the Negative.

On motion the following Resolution was submitted. Viz.
"In the 1st Branch of the City Council, Balt^o. 19th Feb^r 1814
Resolved that the Mayor be respectfully requested to cause
to be laid before the Council, as soon as convenient, an accurate
account of all monies due to this Corporation, other than that
contained in the Registers annual exhibit, and the names of
the persons from whom the same is due; and also the progress
made in any Law-suits for the recovery of the same, if
any such have been instituted".

Which being read a first, & by special order the second
time was concurred in and sent to the Mayor.

Which being read a first and by special order the second time
was concurred in & sent along with the Mayor's communication
to the second Branch, who returned the same endorsed "Concurred
in".

The Committee to whom was referred the consideration of
the petition of Martin F. Maher, made the following report.

"We your Committee on the petition of Martin F. Maher beg
leave to say, that they have examined the wharf and find that
part where the saw-mill is intended to be erected is all inclosed by
wharf, and cannot have any tendency to endanger by fire
any other property than that of the petitioner, we therefore beg leave
to report by Resolution.

"Resolved by the first and second Branches of the City Council
that Martin F. Maher have leave to erect on the lower or Baltimore
end of McEldeys Wharf, a shed or coop over a saw-mill, with
such gates and other inclosures of wood, as is necessary to secure
said building, any ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding."
Which being read a first and by special order the second
time was concurred in, and sent to the second Branch for their
concurrence, who returned the same endorsed "Assented to with
the proposed amendments, to wit. at the end of the Resolution
