The Branch met agreeably to adjournment, present James Carey Esquire President, and all the other members except Messrs Mosher & Dunwoody.

The following Resolution was submitted, to wit.

"Resolved by both Branches of the City Council that the Mayor be and is hereby requested to remove his office to the House belonging to the Corporation in Holliday Street as soon as it can with convenience be done."

Which being read a first and second time by special order was concurred in, and a Committee consisting of Messrs. Ross and Jamison, in conjunction with the Mayor, appointed to examine into the state of the building.

The following Message was sent to the second Branch

Gentlemen of the second Branch

We find that the appropriation for the payment of the journal of accounts is short by three hundred dollars of what will be necessary for the purpose - We therefore propose, with your concurrence, to alter that item in the appropriation Bill (which is not yet engrossed) to \$1800.00 instead of \$1500.00." to which proposal the second Branch agreed, by message, and the alteration made in the appropriation Bill accordingly.

A Bill entitled "A further supplement to the Ordinance, in relation to the appointment of Wardens of the port of Baltimore, and for other purposes" was on motion submitted and read a first & second time by special order, proposed

381 and sent to the second Branch for their concurrence.

On motion therefor the Branch adjourned until tomorrow afternoon. 3 O'Clock.
