

88 for their bravery and good conduct at the battle of North Point.

5th Resolved that the thanks of the City of Baltimore be, and they are hereby presented to the Chairman, Secretary & members of the late Committee of Vigilance and safety, composed principally of persons exempt by Law from bearing arms for their great and meritorious exertions during the whole of the Campaign, for the fidelity with which they executed their arduous duties in providing money and other ways and means of defence, at a time when difficulties and obstacles of an almost insuperable nature presented themselves; in furnishing materials, implements and labor for fortifying an open City - in attending personally to the execution of the several Military works - in providing Military stores & supplying provisions for their fellow Citizens in the Field Fortifications and leaving nothing undone that was at the time practicable.

And be it further Resolved that the Mayor be and he is hereby directed to cause the names of the said Committee to be printed at full length together with a copy of these Resolutions, and of the report of the Committee of the City Council recommending appropriate paintings of the events of the 12th & 13th of September 1814, and also of the General Orders of Major General Smith & Brigadier General Winder, detailing the particulars of the attack, and of the reports made by Major General Smith, Brigadier General Stricker, Commodore Rodgers and Lieutenant Colonel Armistead, on fine Vellum or parchment, in such manner as that the same may be set in frames, and when completed that they be placed in the Council Chamber of the First Branch until a suitable building be procured, as herein before mentioned.

6th Resolved that the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to transmit to each of the Officers named in the first, second and third Resolutions, a copy of all the foregoing Resolutions, and that the expense which may be incurred in carrying into effect the several provisions contained therein;

Which being read the first time was ordered to lie on the table.

The Committee to whom was recommended the consideration of Edward Pannells petition submitted the following additional report which being read the ^{first} second time by special Order was concurred in. viz "The Committee to whom was referred the petition of

Edward Pannell beg leave to report, upon a more thorough ~~exam~~ investigation of the matter to which his petition relates and after a consultation with the attorney of the City they are of opinion his prayer ought not to be granted - they therefore recommend that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition.
