

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that the City Commissioners be and they are hereby authorized to draw on the Register of the City for a sum not exceeding Eighteen dollars and thirty nine cents for the purpose of paying a balance due to Frederick Kreis, for work done for the use of the City.

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to forward to General ^{Samuel} Smith a copy of the Memorial of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, praying that a Navy yard be established at Baltimore, and soliciting his usual prompt attention to the attainment of that (most desirable) object when brought under the consideration of the Senate of the United States.

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that the City Commissioners with the approbation of the Mayor, be and are hereby authorized to take up and repair that part of Pratt Street, between Frederick Street and Market Space, which was heretofore paved, provided the owners of the property where the Street has been widened agree to pay for the paving of the (new part) and the sum of One hundred and Eighty dollars, or so much thereof as ^{may be} necessary is hereby appropriated for that purpose to be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

An Ordinance to regulate the buying and selling of fire wood within the City of Baltimore.
Be it enacted and Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, either for themselves, or in trust for, or on account of any other person to buy (unless for his ^{own} or their own use) or trade for and sell again any fire wood brought to the City of Baltimore whatever, unless the person or persons purchasing the same shall immediately place it in some wood yard, and sell or dispose of it therefrom, and any person who shall offend against the provisions of this Ordinance shall forfeit at the ^{rate of} five dollars per cord for all wood so bought or sold, to be appropriated, the one half to the informer, and the other half to the use of the City.
