Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore that the Register be and he is hereby authorized and directed with the approbation of the Mayor to pay to the order of the City Commissioners sixty dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to put up a fence on the division line as established on the 28<sup>th</sup> August 1823 between the property of George Heide and that of West Potten Field, provided that George Heide pay his proportion of said fence on the whole division line.

An Ordinance relative to certain Springs and Fountains.

Sec. I. Be it enacted and Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that there shall be annually appointed, a keeper of each of the City Springs, and that the Board of Health with the approbation of the Mayor shall have power to make rules and regulations for the protection of the several public Springs and Fountains and the government of the persons who may frequent the same, and any person offending against such rules and regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for each offence.

Sec. II. And be it enacted and Ordained that the Register with the approbation of the Mayor, be and he is hereby authorized to direct the payment of small sums from time to time to the keepers of the different public Springs for the payment of tools, utensils, &c. to keep the establishments clean and in order, provided they shall not exceed ten dollars a year for each establishment. Also twenty five dollars per annum to provide in like manner for the labor of cleaning the Centre Market Fountain, to be expended under the direction of the Assistant Market Master.

An Ordinance to appoint Superintendants of Streets and Pumps and to enforce useful regulations.

Sec. I. Be it enacted and Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, that the Commissioners of Health be and they are hereby authorized and required, with the approbation of the Mayor, to divide the City into two districts as equal as may be, and that there be annually appointed one person for each of the said districts, who shall be called Superintendants of Streets and pumps and shall reside in the districts for which they have been respectively appointed.

Sec. II. And be it enacted and Ordained, that it shall be the duty of the said Superintendants daily to visit every part of their respective districts, to give immediate notice to the Mayor of all offences committed against the Ordinances and laws, and under his direction to cause the same to be rigidly enforced and to perform all such duties as the Mayor may require of them.

Sec. III. And be it enacted and Ordained, that it shall be the duty of the Superintendants of Streets to conform to and execute all orders which they shall receive from the Commissioners of Health conformably to any of the Ordinances of this Corporation, and they are hereby charged with the Superintendance of pumps and wells, and the fire plugs under the direction of the City Commissioners.

Sec. IV. And be it enacted and Ordained, that no person whatsoever shall remove or carry away any manure or dirt out of any paved Street, Lane or Alley within the City, unless by the authority of the Commissioners of Health, except manure or dirt which they themselves may have temporarily deposited thereon, and that every person offending herein shall forfeit and pay the sum of three dollars for each and every load of manure or dirt so removed or carried away and in proportion for any lesser quantity.

Sec. V. And be it enacted and Ordained, that if any owner or driver of any wagon, cart or other carriage, shall place any such wagon, cart or <sup>other</sup> carriage, or horses on any Street Lane or Alley of this City, so as to obstruct the passage of any other carriage, or shall suffer the same to remain therein when not in use, for a longer time than twenty four hours, or a stage for time longer than twelve hours, such owner or driver shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of one dollar, and for every twelve hours the said wagon, cart
