Yeedn^o v^o You: 13th 1815.

I wrote to you by the Post of yesterday, but Mr. McGill informs me he omitted to put his letter in the mail - It was to advise you that I had transmitted \$1800 in Bank Notes to Mr. Shaw to be deposited in the Trade Bank to your credit - Unfortunately Mr. Shaw would only receive \$1186 - of that sum they are to your credit - & what was still more unfortunate ^{for long} 160 of ^{the} projected notes proved to be counterfeited - Mr. Brokenbaugh is now here & in much uneasiness of mind, he has determined to go to the district of Col^a with a view to obtain from the Banks there such notes as will suit you - most of his are from the District Banks - he is at present the object of enquiring information & assistance, in effecting the object of exchanging his paper, which I hope & beg you will give him - he may have some chance of meeting with the knave who palmed three counterfeited \$50 Bills upon him, purporting to be notes of the Bank of Pennsylvania - he paid me \$300 - this day in part of his note leaving a balance still due of \$805 - (Eight Hundred & five dollars) which I hope he will have in his power to pay to you - I wrote to you this morning, by Miss Bld Smith, & the letter was sent by Mr. Shaw to the Trade Post Office with his notification to you that \$1186 were this day deposited in the Trade Bank subject to your order - with great affection I remain
