Drug abuse 5th Dimension on seminar set 'The Ed Sullivan Show' for the 20th

The seminar on Medical/Legal Approaches to Drug Abuse, originally scheduled for January 14, 1971, has been rescheduled for Saturday, February 20, 1971 at the Lord Baltimore Hotel.
